From The HOA President

Montreux Neighbors and Friends,

We opened the month of September with a great neighborhood BBQ and everything went as planned, even the weather. The turnout was one of the best on record and I'm sure the weather had a whole lot to do with it but it was a great day with a great group of neighbors! Having said that, there was a whole lot of work and effort required to put the BBQ together and many thanks goes out to Ali Tamblyn who is in charge of the neighborhood social events, she did a great job coordinating the event along with help and assistance from other board members; Phil Saffel, Christina England's husband "Ken", Jay Willenberg, Alice Chen and her husband "Allen" along with retired board member Myrt Nelson. Thanks to all!

The board is working very hard to keep our neighborhood a place to be proud of, neat, fun and most importantly safe! If we all work together to be sure our neighborhood meets this criteria, it would help tremendously in keeping our investments growing. The latest report is that Seattle and the surrounding areas ranked 11th in the nation in growth in 2014 and 2015. Reports also show that homes in Montreux and the surrounding areas



have increased approximately 13% over the last couple years. I look around and visit adjoining neighborhoods like The Highlands and Talus, see what they are paying for homes in these neighborhoods and am very excited about the opportunities we offer here in Montreux for further growth in our property values as long as we work to protect that.

The entrance with its wonderful waterfalls, the ponds, the surrounding trees, our Natural Growth Environment (NGPE), the fantastic views off of our North Western slope and the beautiful trees lit up at night while you drive up Village Park Drive to enter your neighborhood along with the entrance flowers and monuments and most of all our neighborhood is safe.

All of this takes managing and all of this takes effort and especially now since things are aging we need to work harder to keep our neighborhood this way.

First investment that everyone can make is to report anything that will impact the reason we live here. Even if it seems small we need to know. In this day and age of communication it takes only seconds to report anything that seems out of place. Everyone on the board takes pride in our neighborhood and we need to know anything that jeopardizes that. Our contact information is on the Montreux website. A Reminder About Trees

As many of you know you need to contact me if you wish to cut down a tree on your property or if you notice what looks like a hazardous tree in the Native Growth Protection Easements (NGPE). The rules are different in each instance.

A tree (or trees) can be cut down on yor property, however the City of Issaquah require a Tree Removal Notice to be completed and sent to them if the tree is 6" in diameter or greater up to 30" measured 4ft above the ground. The HOA also needs to give approval. For larger '30" and above, Landmark' trees a permit is required. I can help you navigate through the paperwork and the restrictions on the number of trees allowed. (It depends on the lot size and the number of existing trees that will remain).

In the NGPE areas no cutting, pruning or clearing of trees or shrubs is allowed unless the tree is determined to be hazardous. An ISA certified arborists report is required and the work is to be completed only by a Tree removal companny under the management of the HOA.

Most of the trees deemed hazardous are reduced to snags about 20-30ft high. They must lay where they fall and no branches removed. Remember this is wild life habitat and reseve and not a private park.
