Update on 2023 Work

Our 2023 budget communicated that three big projects would be completed by the end of this year. Let me provide a brief update and in the spirit of gratitude, thank the leaders who coordinated the work.

The biggest project, that was completed at the end of September, was the upgrade to the lights on Village Park Drive. The lights, that had been installed in 2016, were failing. Three separate electricians and the manufacturer could not determine what was causing the lights to fail. Suresh Kumar, a homeowner and engineer, took the lights apart and determined a connector that the electricians thought was water proof, was not. Water was getting into the cannisters through the bottom connector. Suresh and volunteers took apart 50+ in-ground light cannisters and cleaned them. Suresh added epoxy to each one and reassembled them with upgraded parts. The electricians reconnected the lights. A former president shared with me this week, "This is the first time my wife and I have seen all the lights work in years and years. Thank you."

Suresh, thank YOU for your persistence and tenacity.





The next project that was identified in the budget was significant maintenance to our stormwater ponds. These ponds prevent flooding in our community. Vegetation was removed in the springtime and fall. During the hot weather, several algae treatments were applied to the ponds. Pro-vac checked to ensure water was flowing from one pond to the next. Thank you to Carrie Blanton, chair of the ponds/lakes committee, for working closely with the lake captains, creating a year-long plan, and ensuring the plan was implemented.



The final identified project was upgrading many portions of the irrigation system. In addition to the normal maintenance of changing and adjusting irrigation heads, problem valves were serviced, aging valve boxes and handles replaced, and a new controller installed. Warren Hansen, irrigation chair, spent countless hours leading and troubleshooting this work, updating spreadsheets, and making recommendations to improve the system in the future. Warren, thank you.



• Finally, many of you remember me communicating the permitting challenges we were having with the City of Issaquah. Aside from one issue related to the rim lots (more to follow), all the issues have been resolved without paying any of the \$3300 permits that were being proposed. As I mentioned in the past, Sanaz Imen, ACC/NGPE chair and a research engineer who specializes in water and pond issues, needs to be commended for leading us to resolution with the City. Her high levels of professionalism, integrity, and humility are appreciated.

Rim Lot Owners

(Sanaz Imen ACC/NGPE Board Member)

The Board was notified this summer that there has been a new change in Issaquah's Municipal Code. Even though Montreux's CC&Rs contain language that allows for Vegetation Management Zones (VMZ), the City will no longer be recognizing the VMZs. The critical area code update increased protections for slope stability throughout the City and will require this level of assessment for pruning or removal on slopes such as these in the Montreux neighborhood.

For future tree pruning in the steep slope with or without NGPE, the request from homeowners can only achieve approval from the City if the homeowner provides an arborist report that shows the work is necessary for the viability of the tree(s) and surrounding forest health, and that there will be no impact to the slope conditions, or if the slope conditions warrant the removal to provide geotechnical stability. In addition to an arborist report, an assessment from a geotechnical engineer may be necessary to confirm any proposal will not impact the stability of the slope. Recology

As you are aware, Recology increased our rates as of July 1, 2023. They also expanded some helpful pickup options:

- Once annual on call collection of up to two bulky items and 1 yard of waste for all residential customers.
- On call collection of fluorescent light bulbs, batteries, motor oil, and small appliances.

You will need to call their office at 425-837-1234 to ask questions about eligible items and pick up instructions. The Issaquah store, located at 317 NW Gilman Blvd #22, is another drop off option for many of the same items and rigid Styrofoam packing blocks as well as other items. If you have questions about what you can drop off at their location, the phone number is 425-392-0285.

Recology King County offers a residential curbside Special Item Recycling program for certain items that are not accepted inside your recycling container. Other items may be brought to the <u>Recology Store</u> in Gilman Village.

Pumpkin-Chocolate Chip Cookie Recipe ared this great cookie recipe last Thanksgiving.

A friend shared this great cookie recipe last Thanksgiving. The cookies were a hit!

Ingredients

- ✓ 1 cup canned pumpkin puree
- ✓ 1 cup granulated sugar
- ✓ ½ cup vegetable or canola oil
- ✓ 1 large egg
- ✓ 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
- ✓ 1 teaspoon milk
- ✓ 2 cups all-purpose flour
- ✓ 2 teaspoons baking powder
- ✓ 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- ✓ 1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice, add an extra teaspoon if you like spice
- ✓ ½ teaspoon fine sea salt
- \checkmark 1-2 cups semi-sweet chocolate chips, leave some for the tops Instructions
 - ✓ Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or a baking mat.
 - ✓ In a large bowl, stir together pumpkin, sugar, vegetable oil, vanilla, and egg until smooth. In a small bowl, dissolve the baking soda in milk and stir into the wet ingredients.
 - ✓ In a separate large bowl, mix the flour, baking powder, cinnamon, pumpkin pie spice, and salt. Stir the flour mixture into the pumpkin mixture just until you see a few flour streaks. Fold in chocolate chips. Do not overmix.
 - ✓ Using a spoon, drop the cookies about 2 inches apart on the baking sheet. Bake 10-13 minutes or until the center is done.
